Modus Operandi: The Mentors meet the Mentees outside the teaching schedules twice a semester for a duration of an hour each. The Mentors will maintain a register to record the attendance of the Mentees. The Mentors then commence the session with a Pep Talk in order to stimulate more interest in students in their academic activities. The grievances of the students pertaining to their studies may be registered by the Mentees. The Mentors by paying patient attention can guide them to overcome such bottlenecks. The intimacy that develops between the Mentors and Mentees will finally lead to frank discussion on issues regarding family conflicts, financial constraints, teenage tantrums, unhealthy distractions etc. If things are getting out of control, the Mentees could be directed to professional counsellors. In most of the cases compassion and kindness on the part of the Mentors would render outstanding results. At times, the Mentors can accomplish difficult tasks if and when they call parents for additional support. It is the duty of the Mentors to help the Mentees set reasonable goals and objectives, in spite of unexpected diversions and digressions. The Mentors shall maintain a record of the number of days the Mentees were absent from classes and the reasons attributed to their absence. Moreover, the information in respect of the academic distinctions achieved by the Mentees, special awards and the services rendered by them inside and outside academic campuses. Such an approach will be a tremendous morale booster to them. Drawbacks and remedies in the Mentoring System In Co-education institutions Mentoring will be a challenging task. Therefore, Mentoring is offered separately for boys and girls. Crowded Classes are divided into small groups each consisting of nearly twenty students. Due to the shift system mentoring during zero hours is done by setting aside regular classes twice a semester. In the milieu of COVID-19 Pandemic mentoring hours are conducted online. If the mentoring is avowedly carried out, it eliminates the disruptive tendencies and nurtures enlightened minds. 4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website)

The College maintains laboratory facilities and equipment in a safe operating condition and ensures that all laboratory proceedings and experiments are conducted in a safe and prudent manner. All the laboratories comply with the regulations relating to ventilation systems, environmental controls and other exhaust devices. The department of English has Language Laboratory with one server and forty computers, an Audio Visual Hall with a TV, LCD projector and motorized screen. Library: The Library is fully automated. The ID cards and books of staff and students are pasted with bar-coded labels. Student entry is through e-gate. AutoLib library software is used to issue books. Books can be searched through OPAC. A website is created for the convenience of students to inform them about the library working hours, resources available at the library, recent events conducted by the library and list of newspapers, magazines and journals. One server and twelve computers are available in the library and the Internet Cafe. The library has created "Student Readers Forum" and "Forum for Civil Service Aspirants". Sports: The College emphasizes the importance of sports and considers them as an integral part of the curriculum. The schemes and the facilities available for promoting sports and games are: Sports Quota in Admission, Course Fee concession, Hostel fee concession, Credit of attendance, Travel Allowance, Day Allowance, Medals and Honours at the College Day Celebrations, Cash Awards, Free Sportswear, Supplementary CIA Test, Intramural competitions, Inter-Departmental Competitions. Computing Facility: The College has 337 computers, 21 ICT-enabled classrooms, an e-Library, an e-Conference Hall, two Seminar Halls, a Language Laboratory, an Audio-Visual Hall, Wi-fi modems, propriety softwares and three in-house built softwares. These learning spaces are also utilized for organizing Guest Lectures, Seminars, Conferences, Workshops, Training Programmes, Inter-Collegiate Academic Festivals and Recruitments Drives. The Programmer, Hardware Engineer, Software in-charge and Electricians / Plumbers look after the facilities such

as computers systems, LCD Projectors / Smart Boards, software in computer systems and UPS / Inverters / All Electrical Equipment / RO Plants / Water supply equipment respectively. Classrooms: The College runs 46 programmes under Aided and Unaided categories and it puts to optimum use, its 58 classrooms by conducting classes in two shifts. Apart from this 16 Add-on courses and Spoken English classes are conducted. The incubation centre facilitates the conduct of typewriting classes with 64 typewriters, to provide hands-on training to commerce students. The maintenance of the buildings, the classrooms and the laboratories are taken care of by a maintenance Engineer and a full-time building Supervisor. The College has also appointed supervisors, electricians, plumbers, carpenters, laboratory assistants, technical assistants, gardeners, sweepers, scavengers and markers for the maintenance of infrastructure facilities, equipment and for the upkeep of the campus. The Management has appointed two full-time system administrators and one Hardware Technician for the maintenance of Computers and their accessories. Apart from this, the College also utilizes the services of the external Hardware Professionals whenever needed. The UPSs are maintained under AMC.

5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

Election to the Students' Council was conducted on 05.07.2019. Every year, the office bearers and class representatives are elected in a fair and democratic way through e-voting system. Election notification and schedule will be circulated to the students, adequate time was given for nomination, withdrawal and contest. The electronic voting system has been introduced and followed for the last 7 years. A reservation of 50 was given to female students for their representation in the Council. The 50 quota is being allotted by rotation every year. During the current year 2019-2020, there are 43 male representatives and 44 female representatives. The details of the class representatives in the Aided and Unaided streams are given below. The activities of the Student's Council was inaugurated with a function on 16.07.2019. The Secretary of College, Managing Committee, other Members of the Managing Committee and faculty members participated and felicitated the newly elected office bearers and representatives. In co-ordination with the Seethakkathi Tamil Peravai, Students' Council of our College has conducted the book releasing ceremony on 06-08-2019, Sahithya Awardees S. Dharman, and Colachel Yousuf were the invited speakers. 'Kala Nadhi' a poetry collection by the Students' Council was released on the occasion. Pongal Debate was jointly organised by the Students' Council and Department of Tamil on 07.01.2020. International Tamil Language Day was celebrated in our College on 21.02.2020 in co-ordination with the Students' Council. In our college a Self-development Centre was inaugurated in the name of AGAM in co-ordination with the Students' Council which was inaugurated on 18-08-2019. Through AGAM a special lecture was conducted in co-ordination with the Students' Council on 25-09-2019. In this meeting C. Saravanan, Assistant Commissioner of Police was invited and he spoke on the topic "Women Social Welfare". A special lecture was organised by AGAM on 16-12-2019 on the topic Women and Safety. Students' Council of our college celebrated International Women's Day on 09-03-2020. The philanthropic activities of our Students' Council are highly appreciable. The Students' Council of our College has three Social Welfare Schemes which includes Students Self-Help Scheme (SSHS), Students Help in First Aid (SHIFA) and Manitham. For these schemes students voluntarily contribute funds and these funds are distributed to the needy. Through the SSHS a sum of Rs. 49,260 was collected from the students and a sum of Rs. 2,000 each was distributed to 22 economically weaker students from different classes in order to meet their academic expenses. Under the SHIFA, Rs. 1,45,640/- has been collected and out of this fund Rs. 33,900/- was distributed to a child affected by cancer and similarly Rs. 76,715/- was distributed to another cancer patient. The Students' Council has collected relief materials worth Rs. 10,00,000/- from Students, Staff and from Common Public towards the Cyclone of Kerela.

Across the campus and departments, in pursuance of knowledge, the Management, Principal and faculty serve round the clock. The Management vests power and authority in the principal. He, in turn, being the head of the institution, disperses duties and responsibilities accordingly. Thus, the organogram helps the institution run smoothly catering for the needs of the stakeholders/students/society. The academic calendar is prepared by an exclusive team of faculty. This calendar committee, in consultation with the HoDs, plans and gets the calendar ready with the details of seminars, conferences etc. The 44 committees formed make sure that every department functions without the hurdle of red-tapism. The college system is thus that every teacher becomes an acolyte to the principal, and the Management so as to ensure regularity on campus and among students. The 44 committees that function at the behest of the principal make sure that the needs of the institution across the board is fulfilled round the clock. There are 6 Deans in the college to look into various academic functions on the campus. The HoDs, with their responsibilities, steer the departments adhering to the rules successfully. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell Steering Committee (The IQAC Steering Committee) is one of the academic advisory bodies. With its first meeting on July 30, 2019, the Steering Committee meets frequently to take stock of the institution's activities. The Management of Sadakathullah Appa College (Autonomous) is a participative Management. The Tuesdays saw the visit by the Management on the campus. With the demarcation of participation and interference, the college Management actively participates in the various academic activities of the institution. The progressive Management takes active part in the college Governing Board meetings that approves, after scrutiny, the essential ones for the welfare of the college, faculty and the students. At a regular basis, the Governing Board meets twice a year. The Management of Sadakathullah Appa College (Autonomous) meets the faculty every now and then to discuss and take stock of the progress. The representatives of the college Student Council, every year, are met and appreciated by the Management. Further, the Management takes part enthusiastically in the Annual Alumni meeting and Parent-Teachers Association regularly. Research and Development

The Research Promotion Committee functioning with the Principal as Chairperson and senior faculties as Dean of Research and Development and Research Heads shall be responsible for implementing the research policy of the college by following the guidelines of the University and the college management. Faculty from 9 departments guide research scholars. 133 scholars are working under 42 approved research supervisors. The RPC promotes research among the faculty and scholars through several initiatives. Scholars from the Research Centre of Chemistry and Microbiology were sanctioned by the TNSCST with the funding of Rs.7,500/- each. One scholar from the Research Centre of English received the Junior Research Fellowship.

Examination and Evaluation

The institution follows the ratio of 25:75 pattern for theory papers and 40:60 pattern for practicals. There is no passing minimum mark in the internal. Three Continuous Internal Assessment tests are conducted per semester. Each CIA is for 20 marks. Average of the best two along with 5 marks for the Assignment is calculated. The valuation is done by external examiners alone. However, the Chairperson of each valuation board is the senior internal faculty. The Institution follows single valuation system for UG and double valuation for PG and M.Phil courses. Mark Statements are issued with seven security features. Online conduct of Internal and External Examinations has been facilitated through separate links on the College Website. The evaluation of both Internal and External Examinations are also done online. CIA marks are entered online on the College website by the faculty.

Teaching and Learning

91 staff members are Ph.D. holders, among which, 42 are approved guides. The College has 21 ICT-enabled classrooms, 5 functional Smart classrooms, an Audio-Visual Hall, a Language Lab, an e-Library and an e-

Conference Hall. The Department of Zoology maintains a museum with 670 specimens. The College has a herbal garden with 78 plant species. The Department of Business Administration periodically conducts Group-Discussions. The College provides OD to staff members for presenting papers and serving as resource persons at various State, National and International seminars, conferences and workshops. The research scholars are motivated to present their seminar through PowerPoint presentations.

Curriculum Development

The meetings of the Boards of Studies are periodically conducted for the revamping of the syllabi. A total of 34 webinars, 8 quizzes, 24 Spoken tutorial, 2 Virtual Power Seminars, 3 Training Programmes (Non-Teaching Staff) have been organized in all the disciplines. Computer Assisted Language Learning (CALL), A Practical Course in Spoken English are two courses offered as Innovative papers. The Choice Based Credit System facilitates the offering of Skill Based Electives, Elective Paper, Non-Major Elective, NPTEL Couress, Value Education, Environmental Sciences, Part-V programmes, Career Oriented Programmes, Add-On-Courses and Project for UG / PG Students

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

1. Towards the establishment of a nursery garden on the campus, The Department of Botany has been sanctioned with research project, worth Rs.25,00,000/- by the Botanical Survey of India, Kolkata. 2. The college encourages minimal usage of plastics and paper cups and encourages the use of banana leaves and stainless steel glasses for all programmes conducted on the campus. 3. Saplings are being planted on a regular basis in and around the campus as part of the Independence Day and Republic Day celebrations, NSS, NCC programmes and on the World Environment Day. 4. 20KW Solar power has been installed and LED lights are used in the College in order to reduce energy consumption. 5. Best Practice I Title of the Practice: Students Self Help Scheme (SSHS)
Objectives of the Practice: • To ease the financial constraints of the students and prevent their abrupt discontinuation of studies due to their pitiable economic condition. • To help the students attain their goals without any hurdles. • To sow the seeds of munificence and philanthropic thoughts among the

young minds. • To extend financial aid to all the deserving students without any discrimination on the basis of religion, caste, creed and gender. • To build confidence among the economically backward students and to instill in the young minds that money cannot be a hindrance for the thirst of having education. • To effectively utilize the available human resource. Context: Sadakathullah Appa College admits students from several parts of the state. It has been perceived from the profile that many a number of students joining the institution come from economically subjugated background. The reason behind this is many students are either fatherless or motherless children whose single parent is unable to financially meet with the educational needs. Another major reason is many students come from rural background where education is not given much importance and considered as an expensive entity. Due to the reasons mentioned above, many students quit in the middle of the programme. In order to help the students in tackling the hardship, the college initiated a scheme called 'Students Self Help Scheme'. Practice: The role of the Students' Council deserves great recognition concerning the effective implementation of the scheme. Each student voluntarily donates Rs.10 a month to help their friends who are suffering financially and this amount is collected by the members of Students' Council accompanied by other volunteers. The collected amount is distributed among the needy students to meet their educational needs such as semester fee, exam fee, book fee, hostel fee and so on. Evidence of Success: The amount collected under this scheme this year in the aided stream is Rs. 59,260/- and it has been distributed among the nineteen beneficiaries. The establishment of this appreciable scheme helps the financially backward students to concentrate and have a commitment towards their academics. The scheme reduces the economic concerns of the students to a great extent. This way the practice has a progressive influence on the academic abilities and attitudinal changes among the beneficiaries. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: • It is challenging the categorisation of the deserving students who are really in need of financial assistance. • The college needs to watch over whether the beneficiaries are not already supported by other kinds of financial aids such as scholarships and endowments. Best Practices II Title of the Practice: Students Help In First Aid (SHIFA) Objectives of the Practice: • To extend financial assistance to the students who need medical attention. • To lend a helping hand instantaneously at a vulnerable situation to the beneficiary and his/her family. • To provide moral and psychological support to the beneficiary as well as his/her family • To promote the habit of helping people at tough situations among the young energetic minds. Context: In today's speeding world, untoward incidents such as accidents are inevitable and numerous people lose their lives or suffer physical deformities and injuries throughout their lives. At these critical situations, our college stands in the front and helps the needy to meet with their medical expenditures and ensures recovery promptly. This is being accomplished effectively by the college for the past few years by the initiation of a noteworthy and noble scheme called 'STUDENTS HELP IN FIRST AID (SHIFA)'. Practice: STUDENTS HELP IN FIRST AID (SHIFA) initiated by the college is one of the most remarkable schemes that are widely appreciated by many people. This scheme is made successful with the help of the Students' Council and volunteers. The college is being informed about the accident or any untoward incident that needs immediate medical attention of any student through the members of the Student Council. The members accompanied by other volunteers start collecting funds from the students and faculties of the college at the very moment of receiving information about the incident. The collected sum of money is immediately given to the injured student and his/her family to meet with the medical expenses. Evidence of Success: To cite one of the many noble activities beneficiaries, the Students' Council through this righteous scheme has collected a sum of Rs. 1,45,640/- has been collected under this scheme and Rs. 1,10,615 has been distributed to the needy students to meet their medical expenses this year. This scheme has served many students at the

right time. In this way, this virtuous scheme has helped several students in their medical expenditures and quick recovery. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: • At times, due to the lack of time in collecting funds the financial aid may reach the hands of the beneficiary a little later. • The student volunteers happen to miss their regular classes when they go to collect money under the scheme.

As the college vision states, "to provide quality higher education to all" it takes all possible efforts for the students to obtain a proper and quality education. As such, the college offers 47 programmes that include Undergraduate, Post Graduate, MPhil and PhD. The Add-on-Courses are conducted for the students by various departments thrice in a week to develop their knowledge regarding diverse streams of education. The college also takes necessary initiatives to discover and ripen the multiple skills of a student apart from his/her education. The college offers Spoken English Classes conducted by the Department of English to the students of various departments in order to improve their ability of communicating effectively in English as well as to strengthen their fluency and confidence. Typewriting classes are conducted in our college in association with the School of Commerce, Palayamkottai. The students are prepared to appear for the Typewriting Examinations conducted by the Government of Tamil Nadu (DoTE). This academic year, 76 students from aided stream and 184 students from unaided stream have enrolled their names for typewriting classes. The college promotes the significance of education among the deprived sections of the society through a number of institutional scholarships. This academic year, the scholarships offered by various philanthropists and retired staff of the college is Rs.15,48,048 that has been distributed among 551 beneficiaries. Earn While You Learn is another noteworthy scheme introduced by the college to identify the economically disadvantaged students and employing them in convinced positions within the college of which they receive a remuneration of Rs.100/day. This promotes the work culture in them as well as eases their financial constraints. The college does not halt its duty with providing quality education but also cultivates the seeds of social responsibility. The thoughts of serving mankind are replicated in appreciable schemes like SSHS, Manitham and SHIFA. A philanthropic movement named Manitham is in place with a noble cause to aid the deprived and homeless people. Fifteen people are being taken care under this scheme in this year. Students Self Help Scheme (SSHS), has been functioning for the past four years successfully as it eases the pressure of economically disadvantaged students. Each student pays a sum of 10 rupees every month voluntarily under the scheme to help their poor and needy friends. The amount collected under the scheme this year is Rs. 66,000/- and has been distributed to twenty two needy students. Thus, the college strives in providing education with excellence and making students as dynamic personalities of the world in serving mankind. AGAM - The Students' Self Development Scheme helps students to be aware of their potential and guides to achieve exemplary growth and success.
